DORMITORIES TO BE RENOVATED.

When school opens next fall "the worst dormitory in the state" will be an appellation that can no longer be applied to Benton Hall. The plans of the University authorities call for an expenditure of \$10,000 on this building. The entire building will be renovated; floors will be replaced, new wood-work will take the place of the old, the wiring and plumbing will be improved, the walls will be replastered, and if funds permit the walls of the corridors and rooms will be tinted.

About \$5,000 will be expended on Lathrop Hall. The kitchen will be enlarged, and a refrigerating room built in the basement. As in Benton Hall the walls will be tinted if possible.

THE THIRD HOBO CONVENTION.

The third annual Hobo Convention was held Saturday April 15, but was not as much of a success as the others. The afternoon was chilly and few boys turned out but the individual make-ups were probably better than those of last year.

The plans of the afternoon were better laid and carried better out than those of the night session. Instead of going up to More's Switch and coming down on the 1:30 train as was done last year the hoboes came in on the 4:10 and then marched directly to the athletic field where the fence was scaled and the hoboes attended the game in a body.

Less wholesome spirit was shown in visiting the female colleges and begging for supper than in former years. The program at Fyfer's Hall was poor, little entertainment was given, and the whole affair at the dance was dead.

The convention was under individual control but the door keepers and ticket collectors and the people on the program were not connected with the business management. The convention will probably not be held next year unless new and better arrangements are made and it is more of a representative affair.

DR. JESSE HONORED AT VIRGINIA.

Several distinguished educators spoke at the inauguration of President Alderman of the University of Virginia April 13. The speakers of honor were Dr. Jesse, who spoke in behalf of the Universities of the West; Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia University spoke in behalf of the Universities of the South. Dr. Archibald Cary Coolidge of Harvard also delivered an address on "Sister Universities."

BULLETINS FOR FARMERS.

The Agricultural College has recently published two bulletins of considerable importance to farmers. One of them entitled, "Suggestions for Missouri Corn Growers" contains much valuable information concerning the planting and cultivation of our principal crop. The other, "The Farmers' Creamery in Missouri: When and How to Build" is of far reaching importance to those communities in which dairying is a leading industry.

SALEM EXILED.

Because of seditious utterances made through the American press, Geris Youssef Salem, an Egyptian student of the University, has been notified that he must not return to Egypt. In several interviews, Salem has severely criticized the dominant political party in his country and these interviews have been translated into the Egyptian language by the liberal press.

Salem is heir apparent to a large estate in Egypt and may be entirely cut off by government officials. In case this happens he expects to take the lecture platform in America.
