Large figures show where trains meet. Trains run each way every day. Trains will not leave any station before the time fixed in time table. Wood construction and extra trains will keep ten minutes out of the way of time table train. Train going from Rolla to Franklin will have the right of road in preference to train going from Franklin to Rolla, subject to the following rules: Train going from Franklin to Rolla will wait for train going from Rolla to Franklin two hours after its own regular time as by time table, then proceed, keeping full two hours behind its own time as by time table until such delayed train is passed. Train going from Rolla to Franklin if detained one hour and fifty minutes after the regular time, as by time table, will have the right of road and shall keep out of the way of such train going from Franklin to Rolla, by going on a siding not less than ten minutes before the time of arrival of such train proceeding as above. All the general rules of Main Line [except where those that relate to the right of road differ,] will apply to the South-West Branch. The clock in Freight Office at St. Louis being the standard time, the Conductors on S. W. Branch must regulate their watches by those of the Conductor of Mail West, each day. T. McRISOCK, Sup't.

THE ARMY IN KENTUCKY.

(Correspondence of the Cincinnati Gazette.)
HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF CENTRAL KEN.,
LEXINGTON, April 4, 1863.

The army now is of little importance, The troops are being distributed to the advance posts—the day of raids is over. Col. Gilbert returned to-day in search of his scattered brigade, and was ordered to concentrate it for the convenience of the paymasters, at Mt. Vernon. The 19th Ohio battery is detached from it and Conkle's substituted. Nobody but Conkle is pleased at the Change. The 108th and 105th Ohio is added to Gilbert's brigade. Twenty of the Somerset prisoners came in to-day. It appears that Runkle traded somewhat on the capital of the old veteran 44th, since 250 of that regiment, led by Major Mitchell and but 50 of the 45th participated in the brilliant charge at Dutton's Hill. Woolford's conduct throughout was glorious. Returning soldiers represent the rebels killed as numbering nearly ninety. They buried them.

A four-footed rebel, of the most malignant description, was killed while making a raid yesterday, six miles south of the town, in the shape of an immense panther.

The most agreeable item of intelligence is the arrival of Major McDowell, with a small army of paymasters. He avows his intention not to leave Kentucky until every enlisted man entitled to pay has received it. He has inaugurated an excellent system, by means of which the Tennessee and Kentucky pay-rolls may be made so that they can be paid all up to February 28th. This will be an arduous and unofficial labor, undertaken solely for the benefit of the soldiers by the indefatigable Major.

THE FIGHT NEAR SNOW HILL.

CINCINNATI, March 7.—Dispatches from Murfreesboro give the following account of the fight near Snow Hill on the 2d inst. Gen. Stanley with 2,000 cavalry, and Col. Mathews' infantry brigade, started to capture Morgan's and Wharton's eight regiments of infantry and cavalry, at Snow Hill. Beyond Auburn they drove in the enemy's pickets. The 7th Pennsylvania cavalry turned the rebel right, while Minty's cavalry brigade with Newell's battery moved up in front. The enemy fled. The enemy's pickets were then encountered west of Liberty, and a considerable force were posted on bluffs on the opposite side of Smith's ford. They resisted and were driven back and formed again on Dry Fork, from whence they were again driven. The rebels then formed a third and stronger line on Snow Hill. The 2d and 4th cavalry were sent to the enemy's rear. They charged and broke the line of the rebels, when the fight ended in the flight of the rebels. The rebels escaped with their guns.

Let every mother or father in Rolla who would see the rising generation in after years amiable, intelligent and respectable, aid in lifting their wandering feet from the pools of sin through which they are now wading.

CONTEMPLATED NEW CHURCH.

Rev. Smith of the Methodist Episcopal denomination from St. Louis has been among us for the past few days earnestly laboring for the erection and completion of a building in Rolla in which the church going community may assemble to worship a divine being rather than the Lions of War.—Mr. E. W. Bishop has contributed two very handsome lots whereupon to build such a House, and from the spirit manifested at a meeting in Dr. Thrailkill's store Sabbath night, it would seem that there is Christianity and available means enough in Rolla to build a house of worship. Let's see.

FROM FORTRESS MONROE.

FORTRESS MONROE, April 7.—The steamer Spaulding arrived here last evening from Hilton Head, and reports our fleet had all left for Charleston when she left.

A flag of truce boat left to-day for City Point with 869 rebel prisoners for exchange.

A rebel cavalryman, who deserted from the rebel army on the Blackwater and came into Norfolk yesterday, says the rebels are making arrangements to remove their Capitol from Richmond to Chattanooga, and that the scarcity of provisions and forage is the principal cause.

THE ENTIRE DEBT OF THE GOVERNMENT.

The entire debt of the Government of the United States at the present time is \$939,186,147, the aggregate annual interest of which is 3 1-3 per cent. The amount of the debt is much less than the public was led to apprehend, from the speeches and newspapers unfriendly to the Government.

GEN. SCHOFIELD GOING TO THE ARMY OF THE CUMBERLAND.

Gen. Schofield has been ordered to report to Gen. Rosecrans, in whose army he will take command of a Division.
